

Transport of seasonal workers in Queensland during the COVID-19 pandemic

Everyone has a general obligation to keep themselves, their neighbours and the community safe from coronavirus (COVID-19). You must follow Queensland's public health directions for COVID-19.

As seasonal workers move between regions in response to work availability, it is critical to minimise the potential risk of spread of COVID-19 to the communities they travel and temporarily reside in. One risk pathway is the transportation of workers to, from and around the workplace.

Information for seasonal workers, including temporary visa holders

Queensland's state border is closed and travel restrictions and self-quarantine requirements are in place. You must apply for work in Queensland before moving from your current location, and secure a <u>Queensland border pass</u>.

If you are a temporary visa holder or seasonal worker already in Queensland, you are subject to the restrictions in place under the <u>Home Confinement, Movement and Gatherings direction</u>, meaning you should not leave your place of residence unless absolutely necessary.

When transferring to, from and around work, you are required to:

- stay at home if you are unwell
- travel directly to and from work, only undertaking any other essential activities such as shopping for essentials, medical needs or exercise
- practice social distancing by keeping 1.5 metres away from others and avoid contact with others
- wash your hands often and properly with soap and water or use an alcohol-based rub.

Information for private transport providers

New public health directions issued from the Chief Health Officer (*effective from 12:01 am 5 May 2020*) require all agribusinesses, commercial fisheries businesses and labour hire companies employing seasonal workers to have a health management plan in place. Similarly, private or charter workforce transport providers transporting seasonal workers to, from and around a workplace are required to have a health management plan in place, including appropriate record keeping.

Health management plan requirements

A health management plan demonstrates compliance with COVID-19 public health directions and describes the measures that can be implemented to minimise risks of transmission of COVID-19.

A health management plan will need to be completed by private workforce transportation providers engaged in transferring seasonal workers in passenger transport vehicles, such as buses, coaches, mini-vans and courtesy vehicles.

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Obligations for private workforce transport providers

Providers should also be ensuring staff and passengers are complying with the <u>Home Confinement, Movement and</u> <u>Gatherings direction</u>, to ensure:

- passengers achieve social distancing requirements by maintaining a minimum distance of 1.5 metres from each other within the vehicle
- when commuting by bus, minibus or van, passengers will keep at least one vacant seat in all directions, separating them from other passengers
- wherever possible, vehicles should have as much fresh air circulation by adjusting air conditioning or opening windows and allowing air circulation between trips by leaving windows down
- general good hygiene measures and consistent cleaning of vehicles is undertaken, paying particular attention to frequently touched surfaces. To assist in the cleaning of transfer vehicles the <u>factsheet for the</u> <u>cleaning and management of personalised transport</u> provides good guidance
- if any staff are unwell, they should stay home.
